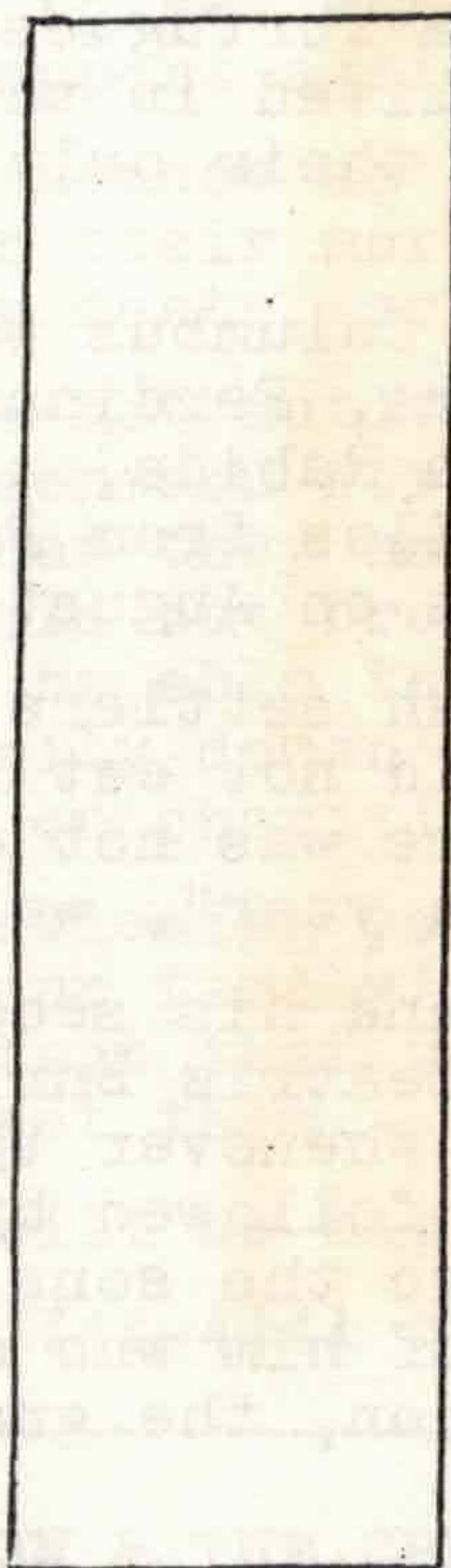
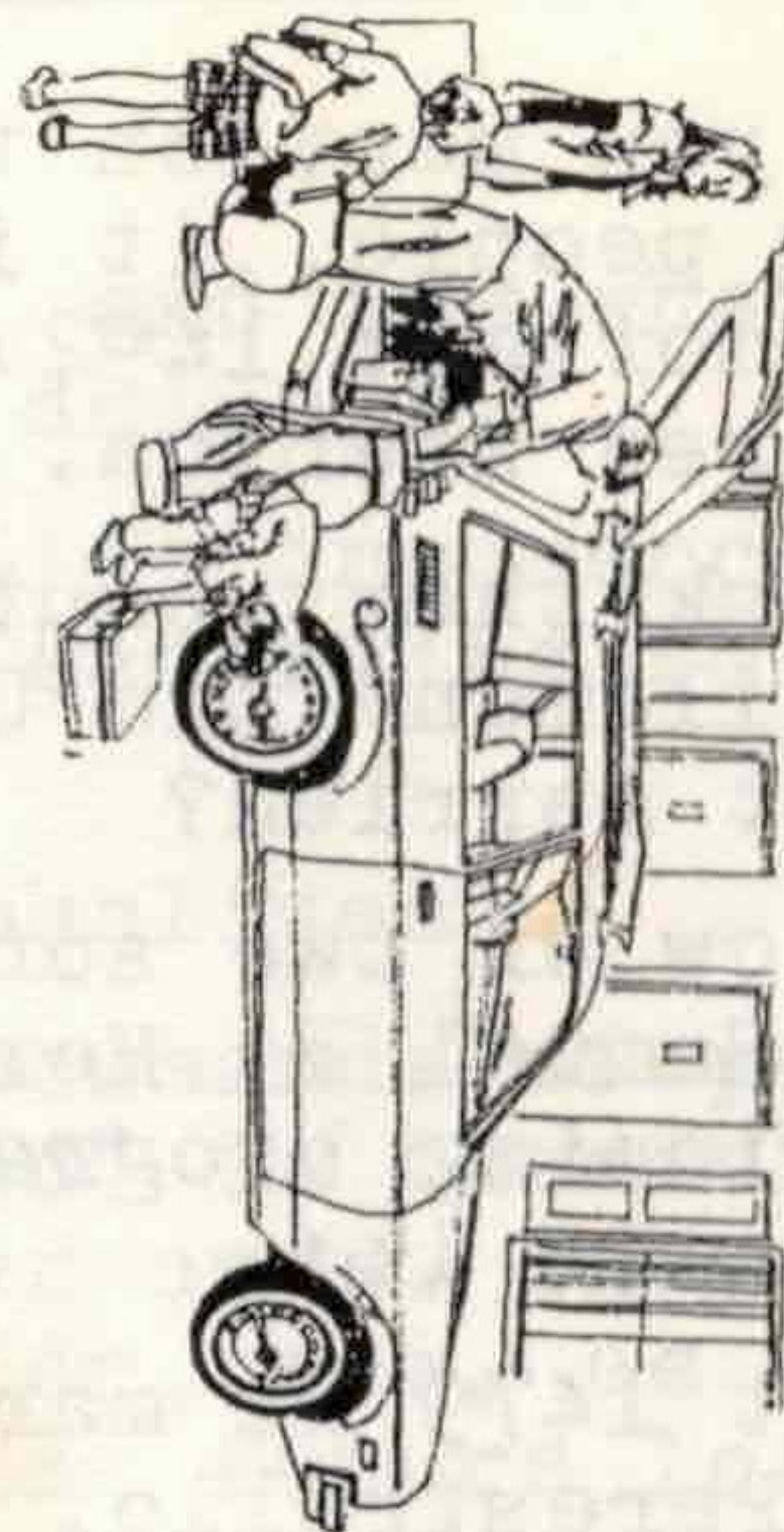

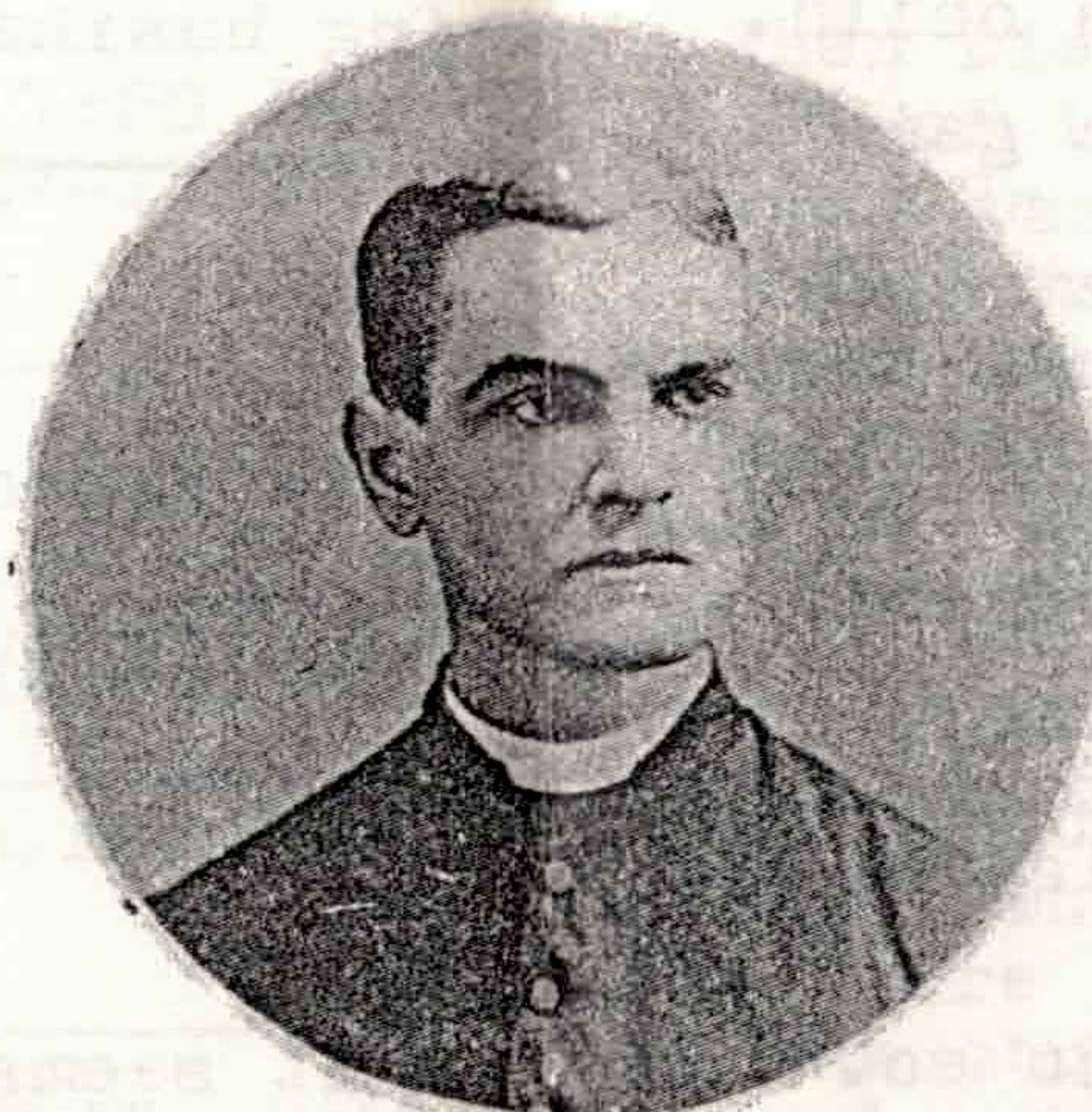

G. WASHINGTON & THE CHERRY TREE--20TH CENTURY

Yes, Father, I chopped down that cherry tree.

You planted it without filing an environmental impact study report. And you failed to get a permit from the City Planting Commission. And you also failed to consult your neighbor, to see if it would cast deleterious shadows upon his private property. Besides, I wanted to test my new hatchet.

When you mention the name Christopher Columbus to many people, it immediately evokes history book memories: 1492...sailed the ocean blue...discovered America.

But ask them about his children--blank stares. What children? Did Columbus have children? Did he ever get married?

We know of two sons: Diego and Ferdinand. Here is how Samuel E. Morison, author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning biography, "Admiral of the Ocean Sea", tells it:

"About 1479 he married a Portuguese lady, Felipa de Perestrello. They lived in the Madeiras. Felipa died shortly after their only child, Diego, was born."

When Diego was about 5, Columbus went to the court of the Spanish rulers, Ferdinand and Isabella. He left Diego at La Rabida, a Franciscan school for boys about 5 miles from Palos, whence he set sail for the Indies on August 3, 1492.

After some of the Spanish settlers returned to Spain, claiming they "could not eat Indian food", but actually because "there was not enough gold to make everyone rich in a year", we read:

"Columbus' son, Diego, and his second son, Ferdinand, whose mother was Beatriz Enriquez de Harana, were pages at court. Whenever they appeared in the streets, they were followed by a gang of rascals shouting, 'There go the sons of the Admiral of the Mosquitoes, of him who discovered lands of vanity and delusion, the grave and ruin of Spanish gentleman!'"

When Columbus set sail on May 9, 1502, on his fourth and last voyage to America, "his 13-year-old son, Ferdinand, went with him. Ferdinand's account of the voyage...is the best we have. Ferdinand had many playmates aboard, for his father preferred strong, lively boys to old salts who were always grumbling and wanting to go home. At least one-third of the people on this voyage were boys between twelve and eighteen years old."
